Our historic district is the largest contiguous National Historic District Landmark in the United States. It has thrived as a result of preservation efforts throughout history, preserving its design and charm through the years.

The City of Madison continues revitalizing these structures with grant programs such as the Preservation and Community Enhancement (P.A.C.E.) Grant, which allocates funds to encourage proper exterior historic rehabilitation and preservation of residential and commercial properties. The City is currently working through Phase I of III to improve Main Street.

The current phase includes:

- · Adding dirt to needed flower beds
- Replanting perennials that were lost from 2021
- Adding mulch
- Three raised beds pilot project

As a test trial, the City will be adding raised beds to the three gardens in front of the City parking lot between McWhiggins & Greves. These will act as a test to guide Phase II & Phase III of their Re-envisioning Main Street Project

Mayor Bob Courtney had the opportunity to swear in new officers to the Madison Police Department, Ben Flint and Kyle Lane. He also welcomed our newest k9 officer, Cain, assigned to Officer Midgett.



The police department also received a generous donation from a local community member in early May. "We can't express how grateful we are for this donation. There is truly no place like Madison," said Police Chief John Wallace.

Mayor Courtney also swore in the newly appointed Madison Fire Department Chief, Ken Washer, and Deputy Chief Jeremy Cornelius. Bill DeVries will continue to serve the Madison Fire Department as the Division Chief/Fire Marshal.

"I have been blessed to be able to lead the Madison Fire Department for the past eight years, and stepping down as fire chief was a difficult decision. My focus for the next few months will be on my family. I am proud of the work of the entire Madison Fire Department and know that Ken Washer and Jeremy will lead the department well," said Bill DeVries, Division Chief.



#### Regional Economic Strategy Summary:

Last month, the City of Madison partnered with the Southern Indiana Regional Planning Commission (SIRPC) to host a roundtable discussion on the importance of economic resiliency and how to better our communities when an economic disaster hits. SIRPC members coordinated the roundtable, and participants included local business owners, bankers, prominent industry representatives, and more.

The panel discussed how Madison and other local communities could best prepare for potential economic disasters in the future. The discussion offered insight that will be incorporated into SIRPC's regional Economic Resiliency Strategy.

## A Note From the Mayor,



As your mayor, community safety is my priority. I promised to work with county and state drug task forces to assertively combat substance abuse issues in Madison through enforcement, prevention, and treatment.

In February, I had the opportunity to meet with the Attorney General's Office in Indianapolis to discuss the importance of programs such as JCAP and the need for funding for substance abuse treatment facilities inside our jails.

In April, County Commissioner Ron Lee and I visited the Jackson County Jail to see first-hand how their substance abuse treatment pod is changing the lives of those incarcerated and their families. LifeSpring President of Recovery Services, Lauren Perryman, shared with us the tools and training available to help these men overcome their addiction, rebuild relationships, develop coping skills, and live a successful life after their sentence.

I look forward to continuing to work with our commissioners to bring a similar program to Madison.


