Thanks to everyone who has participated in our Chistmas events -- we couldn't do it without you!




Grand Marshal: Frank Hayes

At the city's A Very Merry Madison Christmas Parade last weekend, Frank Hayes was honored as the grand marshal after receiving numerous public nominations for this year's position of honor.

Hayes is a beloved Madisonian and veteran who served with USAF Strategic Air Command reconnaissance units following advanced electronics training courses and participated in overseas deployments. He co-authored "We Served With Honor" on the 91st Strategic Reconnaissance Wing RB-47 photo-recon overflights of USSR-denied territory. Hayes has an incredible background and completed programs in field engineering (Philco Corp.), math (Oklahoma University), business and management (NYIT), Life Cycle Cost (George Washington University), and company training conducted at Republic Aviation, Fairchild Republic, Collins Radio and Laboratory For Electronics in addition to his impressive biography of achievements and service. Frank traveled the world and lived in New York for 55 years but chose Madison as his home upon retirement.

"Madison is the most beautiful place to be for Christmas," said Hayes. Often found supporting local shops and restaurants and spreading good

cheer wherever he goes, his generosity and character have earned him the title of "Ambassador of Madison" and he embodies the spirit of the Christmas season. "I'm known for positivity, been known that way since I was a kid."

Madison Police Department

City of Madison Chief of Police Announces Retirement

The City of Madison's Police Department Chief, John I. Wallace, will retire at the end of December 2023.

Beginning his career in 1986 as a patrolman under Mayor Markt Lytle, Wallace served 24 years as a patrol officer, detective, and eventually Chief of Police. Elected as Jefferson County's sheriff in 2010, he served two terms before shifting to the position of Chief Deputy under Sheriff David Thomas. He later served Madison Consolidated Schools as a school resource officer until he was appointed to the City of Madison's Chief of Police by Mayor Courtney in 2020.

"It has truly been an honor and privilege to serve the citizens of Madison and Jefferson County as a police officer," said Chief Wallace. "I have been blessed to serve with some of the best men and women Madison and Jefferson County has to offer and sincerely appreciate the opportunity Mayor Bob Courtney gave me, returning to the city police to finish out my career as chief."



After 37 years of serving as a police officer, Wallace wants to take on the next stage of life and retire alongside his wife, Patti Wallace, at the end of the year. Blessed with four grandchildren, they look forward to spending more time with their family.

"Our department has grown, not only in numbers but in professionalism and pride. I believe the Madison Police Department's best days are ahead; a strong foundation has been established that can be built upon. Thank you for allowing me to serve you as a police officer," said Chief Wallace.

Under Chief Wallace's leadership, the city has seen incredible accomplishments, including growing the department to 34 officers, forming a crime suppression task force, reducing drug-related crime by 22%, creating a traffic division, and implementing Operation Predator Net, which deals with crimes against children.

"Wallace also oversaw creating a part-time officer program, improving evidence handling procedures and best operational practices, among many other things," said Mayor Bob Courtney. "Chief Wallace has worked tirelessly to make Madison a safer place for everyone. I wish him all the best in his retirement."

The City of Madison is now accepting applications for the position of Police Chief, and any interested parties may file a submission online at madison-in.gov/employment. Applications will be accepted through December 17 at midnight.

Dollar General Market



Last month Mayor Courtney, Economic and Redevelopment Director Tony Steinhardt, Devon Sharpe with Madison Land and Title, and Paul Conway, representing Rafferty Development, LLC, completed the final paperwork and closed on the property purchase for the downtown grocery store building. The developers started construction on the new Dollar General (DG) Market property in early December and share that the community can expect to see the doors open by early June, 2024.

This contract marks the official purchase of the property from the city's ownership. The city will begin improving the parking lot on the east side of the building in the coming weeks and will complete these infrastructure improvements by the store's opening date.



Rafferty Development, LLC will be responsible for the renovations (based on approved renderings) as well as incorporating public arts into the project. In addition to the parking lot work, the city is coordinating sidewalk and street improvements throughout the Mulberry Arts Corridor and Second Street, which will include lighting, sidewalks, paved roads, and planting of trees and flowers.

"This project has really been a labor of love for several years," said Madison's Mayor, Bob Courtney. "Welcoming a grocery store into downtown Madison has been a goal of this administration from the very beginning, and closing on the property today marks a huge step forward in a multi-million dollar capital investment for our local community. This grocery store will significantly elevate the quality of life for our downtown and greater Madison area residents."
